A BILL FOR AN ACT CONCERNING LONG-TERM STRATEGIES TO ADDRESS COLORADO'S AGING POPULATION, AND, IN CONNECTION THEREWITH, CREATING A STRATEGIC ACTION PLANNING GROUP TO DEVELOP A COMPREHENSIVE, LONG-TERM ACTION PLAN FOR COLORADO'S AGING POPULATION.

Bill Summary

(Note: This summary applies to this bill as introduced and does not reflect any amendments that may be subsequently adopted. The bill establishes a strategic action planning group (group), appointed by the governor, to study issues related to the increasing

number of Colorado residents 50 years of age and older (older adults) and to issue a comprehensive strategic action plan on aging (plan). The bill directs specific areas for the group to analyze and to make recommendations. The group shall also make two updates to the plan. The bill establishes a cash fund to receive appropriations and gifts, grants, and donations to pay for the group's work.
