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## SENATE BILL No. 291

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DIGEST OF SB 291 (Updated January 22, 2026 3:35 pm - DI 149)

**Citations Affected:** IC 33-23; IC 33-24; IC 33-25; IC 34-30; IC 35-52.

**Synopsis:** Court security. Establishes a procedure to prevent certain personal information of a protected judicial individual from being publically available by a public agency. Creates a civil cause of action against a public agency that fails to remove certain personal information of a protected individual. Makes it a Class A misdemeanor for unlawfully publishing certain personal information. Repeals current code concerning the supreme court sheriff. Allows the supreme court and the court of appeals to each appoint a court marshal and allows each appointed court marshal to hire deputy court marshals. Requires a court marshal to ensure the safety and security of the court. Requires a supreme court marshal and a court of appeals court marshal to carry out certain responsibilities. Provides that a court marshal is entitled to qualified immunity for acts performed in the course of official duties. Specifies that a court marshal has limited police powers and is required to notify the local law enforcement agency as soon as practicable when a security threat is detected. Allows the marshal appointed by the court of appeals to provide for the safety and security of the tax court.

## SENATE BILL No. 291

A BILL FOR AN ACT to amend the Indiana Code concerning courts and court officers.

*Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Indiana:*

1 SECTION 1. IC 33-23-19 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE  
2 AS A **NEW** CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE  
3 JULY 1, 2026]:

4 **Chapter 19. Protection of Personal Information**

5 **Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "protected individual" means a:**

- 6 (1) **current or retired judge (as defined in IC 33-38-12-3);**  
7 (2) **current or retired justice, judge, or magistrate of a federal**  
8 **court domiciled in Indiana; and**  
9 (3) **spouse, child, or dependent who resides in the same**  
10 **household as an individual described in subdivisions (1) and**  
11 **(2).**

12 **Sec. 2. As used in this chapter, "personal information" includes**  
13 **the following:**

- 14 (1) **A home address.**  
15 (2) **A home telephone number.**  
16 (3) **A mobile telephone number.**  
17 (4) **A personal electronic mail address.**

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- 1           (5) A Social Security number.
- 2           (6) A driver's license number.
- 3           (7) A federal tax identification number.
- 4           (8) A credit or debit card number.
- 5           (9) A bank account number.
- 6           (10) A license plate number or a unique identifier of a vehicle.
- 7           (11) A birth or marital record.
- 8           (12) Date of birth.
- 9           (13) A home address displayed on voter registration or
- 10          property tax information.
- 11          (14) Election and campaign finance reports.

12          The term does not include information that has been publicly  
 13          disclosed with the consent of the judicial officer or judge.

14          Sec. 3. As used in this chapter, "publish" means to post or  
 15          otherwise make available to the general public on the Internet,  
 16          social media, or social networks.

17          Sec. 4. (a) A protected individual, or the office of judicial  
 18          administration on behalf of a protected individual, may submit a  
 19          written request to a public agency (as defined in IC 5-14-3-2(q)) to:

- 20           (1) prevent publication of personal information of the
- 21           protected individual; or
- 22           (2) remove personal information of the protected individual
- 23           from an existing publication.

24          (b) A request made under subsection (a) must be sent by  
 25          certified mail or electronic mail and contain the following:

- 26           (1) Sufficient information to confirm that the person subject
- 27           to the request is a protected individual.
- 28           (2) A description of the document, posting, or other
- 29           publication containing the personal information that is sought
- 30           to be removed.

31          A request made by the office of judicial administration that  
 32          certifies that the person subject to the request is a protected  
 33          individual is sufficient for the purposes of subdivision (1).

34          (c) Not later than one (1) day after receiving a request under  
 35          this section, a public agency shall acknowledge receipt of the  
 36          request.

37          (d) After receiving a request under this section, a public agency

- 39           (1) as soon as practicable, take action necessary to ensure that
- 40           the personal information of the protected individual is not
- 41           published; or
- 42           (2) not later than three (3) days after receipt of the request,



- 1           remove all personal information of the protected person from  
2           publication.
- 3           (e) A protected individual or the office of judicial administration  
4           may bring a civil action against a public agency for a violation of  
5           subsection (d). A prevailing party may recover:
- 6           (1) actual damages;  
7           (2) declaratory relief;  
8           (3) injunctive relief; and  
9           (4) costs and reasonable attorney's fees.
- 10          A court may also award punitive damages if the court finds that  
11          the defendant willfully refused to remove the personal information  
12          of a protected person.
- 13          Sec. 5. (a) A person who:
- 14           (1) publishes the personal information of a protected

16           (2) knows or reasonably should know that the publication of

29          AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE

- 31          Chapter 5.1. Supreme Court Marshal
- 32          Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "supreme court marshal" refers  
33          to an appointed supreme court marshal and a deputy marshal  
34          hired by an appointed supreme court marshal under section 2(b)  
35          of this chapter.
- 36          Sec. 2. (a) The supreme court may appoint a court marshal.
- 37           (b) A marshal appointed under subsection (a) has the authority  
38          to hire deputy marshals to assist with the duties required under  
39          this chapter.
- 40           (c) A supreme court marshal serves at the pleasure of the chief  
41          justice until the supreme court terminates the court marshal's  
42          service by an order of the court.



1           **Sec. 3. (a) A supreme court marshal is responsible for the**  
 2 **following:**

3           **(1) Ensuring the safety and security of:**

4               **(A) the justices; and**

5               **(B) staff;**

6           **of the supreme court, including the appellate clerk's office, all**  
 7 **primary office locations, offsite venues, and judicial**  
 8 **residences.**

9           **(2) Attending the court during term time.**

10          **(3) Preserving order within the court.**

11          **(4) Communicating with law enforcement agencies on behalf**  
 12 **of the court.**

13          **(5) Providing trial courts with security assessments, including**  
 14 **education and advice on security needs of judges and court**

16          **(6) Maintaining security systems at the state house, court staff**  
 17 **offices, and the homes of supreme court justices.**

18          **(7) Coordinating and providing security for events within**  
 19 **Indiana that involve the justices or staff of the court.**

20          **(8) Any additional duties as assigned by the chief justice.**

21          **(b) Upon receipt of a process, rule, or order, a supreme court**  
 22 **marshal may transmit the process, rule, or order to the sheriff of**  
 23 **the county within which the process, rule, or order is to be served.**

24          **Sec. 4. (a) When acting in an official capacity, a supreme court**  
 25 **marshal may:**

26               **(1) act as security for judicial officers and court staff in any**  
 27 **county in Indiana;**

28               **(2) use any force necessary to carry out the duties described**  
 29 **in section 3 of this chapter;**

30               **(3) carry a weapon on public and private property;**

17 enforcement agency as soon as practicable when a security threat  
18 is detected. A supreme court marshal may not respond to local  
19 emergencies or incidents not related to court security. A supreme  
20 court marshal shall defer to local law enforcement to effect any  
21 arrest necessary, including the processing of an individual or  
22 pursuit of criminal charges.

23 **Sec. 5. A supreme court marshal is entitled to qualified  
24 immunity for acts performed in the course of official duties  
25 required under this chapter.**

26 SECTION 4. IC 33-25-4-1 IS AMENDED TO READ AS  
27 FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026]: Sec. 1. The clerk and sheriff  
28 of the supreme court shall be clerk and sheriff of the court of appeals.

29 SECTION 5. IC 33-25-4-4 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE  
30 AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY  
31 1, 2026]: Sec. 4. (a) The court of appeals may appoint a court  
32 marshal.

33 (b) A court marshal appointed under subsection (a):

34 (1) serves at the pleasure of the court of appeals until the  
35 court of appeals terminates the court marshal's service by an  
36 order of the court;

37 (2) provides for the safety and security of the court of appeals  
38 and the tax court; and

39 (3) has the authority to hire deputy marshals to assist with the  
40 duties required under this chapter.

(8) Coordinating and providing security for events involving the judges or staff of the court of appeals and the tax court.

(9) Any additional duties as assigned by the chief judge of the court of appeals.

(b) Upon receipt of a process, rule, or order from the court of appeals or the tax court, a court marshal may transmit the process, rule, or order to the sheriff of the county within which the process, rule, or order is to be served.

SECTION 8. IC 33-25-4-7 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS A NEW SECTION TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026]: **Sec. 7. (a) When acting in an official capacity, a court**

Mr. President: I move that Senate Bill 291 be amended to read as follows:

Page 1, between the enacting clause and line 1, begin a new paragraph and insert:

"SECTION 1. IC 33-23-19 IS ADDED TO THE INDIANA CODE AS A NEW CHAPTER TO READ AS FOLLOWS [EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2026]:

**Chapter 19. Protection of Personal Information**

**Sec. 1. As used in this chapter, "protected individual" means a:**

(d) After receiving a request under this section, a public agency shall:

- (1) as soon as practicable, take action necessary to ensure that the personal information of the protected individual is not published; or
- (2) not later than three (3) days after receipt of the request, remove all personal information of the protected person from publication.

(e) A protected individual or the office of judicial administration may bring a civil action against a public agency for a violation of subsection (d). A prevailing party may recover:

- (1) actual damages;



- (2) declaratory relief;
- (3) injunctive relief; and
- (4) costs and reasonable attorney's fees.

A court may also award punitive damages if the court finds that the defendant willfully refused to remove the personal information of a protected person.

Sec. 5. (a) A person who:

- (1) publishes the personal information of a protected individual; and
- (2) knows or reasonably should know that the publication of the personal information presents an imminent risk of:
  - (A) bodily injury to the protected individual;
  - (B) damage to the property of the protected individual; or
  - (C) the commission of a criminal offense against the protected individual;

commits unlawful publication of personal information, a Class A misdemeanor.

(b) The offense under subsection (a) is a Level 6 felony if it results in serious bodily injury to the protected individual."
